Until they speak to everyone as clearly as we hear them through our hearts, there is a great and urgent need for you to join with us in becoming a Voice for Animals.

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Eggplant Rounds 1/2 cup cornmeal

1/2 teaspoon chili powder

1/4 teaspoon dried oregano

salt to taste 1 eggplant, sliced into 1/2 inch rounds

1 quart vegetable oil for frying

In a shallow dish, combine corn meal, chili powder, oregano and salt. Dredge each eggplant slice in this mixture until coated on both the sides. Shake off excess. Heat a small layer of oil in a large skillet. When the oil is hot arrange a layer of the the eggplant rounds in the oil and fry uncovered for 2 to 3 minutes. Flip the rounds over fry until golden brown. Continue adding oil and frying the rounds until they are all fried. Serve either hot or cold.



Spicy Vegan Potato Curry 4 potatoes, peeled and cubed

2 tablespoons vegetable oil 1 yellow onion, diced

3 cloves garlic, minced2 teaspoons ground cumin1 1/2 teaspoons cayenne pepper

4 teaspoons curry powder

4 teaspoons garam masala

1 (1 inch) piece fresh ginger root, peeled and minced

2 teaspoons salt

1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes

1 (15 ounce) can garbanzo beans (chickpeas), rinsed and drained

1 (15 ounce) can peas, drained

1 (14 ounce) can coconut milk



Place potatoes into a large pot and cover with salted water. Bring to a boil over high heat, then reduce heat to mediumlow, cover, and simmer until just tender, about 15 minutes. Drain and allow to steam dry for a minute or two.

Meanwhile, heat the vegetable oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Stir in the onion and garlic; cook and stir until the onion has softened and turned translucent, about 5 minutes. Season with cumin, cayenne pepper, curry powder, garam masala, ginger, and salt; cook for 2 minutes more. Add the tomatoes, garbanzo beans, peas, and potatoes. Pour in the coconut milk, and bring to a simmer. Simmer 5 to 10 minutes before serving.





Black Sabbath's Geezer Butler Urges New York State Legislature to Ban Declawing of Cats

Geezer Butler, founder and bassist of the classic heavy metal band Black Sabbath, has voiced his support for the NYS Declaw Ban. A.1297/2.5084 would make New York the first state in the nation to ban the declawing of cats. Butler issued the follow statement:

"New York is one of Black Sabbath's favorite states to perform in because New Yorkers are smart, open-minded, and compassionate. I am particularly delighted to be coming back to the Empire State after learning from my friends at The Humane Society of the United States that there is a bill before lawmakers that, if passed, would ban the practice of declawing cats. Many know me as one of the founding members of Black Sabbath, but fewer likely know that I am what you might call a "crazy cat person." My wife and I have many rescued cats and we have never dreamed of putting them through an elective, convenience surgery such as declawing. Can you imagine having your fingers chopped off at the last bone? That is what the equivalent is for cats who are declawed. It is dreadfully inhumane! A surge of veterinarians throughout New York support legislation to put declawing in the trash bin of history. I urge lawmakers to remain steadfast in those characteristics I admire most about New Yorkers and support the bill to ban the declawing of cats."

Indiana Senate Passes Bill to Address Pet Homelessness and Euthanasia


The Indiana Senate has approved House Bill 1201, which will significantly strengthen the state's efforts to address pet homelessness and euthanasia in shelters. The bill will require that all cats and dogs be spayed or neutered before adoption from a shelter, rescue or animal control agency. The Humane Society of the United States strongly supports the legislation. Erin Huang, Indiana state director for The HSUS, issued the following statement:

"We are encouraged that the Legislature is taking this action to address companion animal issues in Indiana. This is a great opportunity to build unity, bring organizations together and open possibilities for better tracking spay and neuter data."

What are hairballs???

If you have a cat, you have probably come across a time when there is a blob of unknown matter found on your carpet. It is long, tubular, and brown. Did your cat miss the litter box? Why is there so much fur? OH! The smell!!! What on earth is this???

This my friends, is a hairball.

Hairballs are the result of a cat completing its normal grooming routine and ingesting hair/fur. Although this is routine and a cats digestive system is made for passing the fur through the body, issues can occur. If there is an excess amount of fur, the hair can either be vomited back up, or can actually cause a foreign matter obstruction which may need to be surgically removed.

The biggest help you can give your cat is frequent brushing with a cat specific grooming brush. Most cats that are troubled by hairballs are long haired felines or obsessive-compulsive groomers.

If your cat struggles often with hairballs, seek veterinary care. There are veterinary grade medications such as Lactulose that assist with safely passing hairballs through the intestinal tract.

There are also a number of diets specifically for hairballs that increase fibre intake and help keep the gastrointestinal tract moving. Another effort to reduce hairballs would be to take your cat to a veterinarian or groomer who can shave your cat!

Again, if you find that your four-legged feline friend is constantly vomiting, make sure to seek veterinary care.



"I came across many animals in need when I grew up in the Middle East. The climate and harsh environment put many helpless birds, hedgehogs, and cats in my path. Many animals had been stunned by cars, animal abusers, and other predators. I made it my goal to revive and set free each one that I possibly could. Although it was awful when my aid came too late and animals crossed the Rainbow Bridge, I always tried my best and did what I could. My supplies were limited but I had an aviary set up in my backyard, wonderful educators,



and the will to save lives. Most of the time, the animals needed to be hydrated and have a little bit of time to come out of their shocked state. One of my first rescues was for a sparrow that had literally just hatched and fallen straight out of a very high nest.
